STEARNS ELECTRIC CONTINUES CHANGEOUT OF DEMAND RESPONSE UNITS

In 2021, Stearns Electric Association began a 5-year plan to changeout aging load management receivers with new Aclara demand response units (DRUs).

This summer, our electricians continued changing out residential DRUs. This only impacts member-consumers who are enrolled in a load management program (i.e., dual fuel, storage water heating, cycled air conditioning and/or electric vehicle charging). Impacted members receive direct communication from Stearns Electric before work begins on their equipment.

Changing out the DRUs provides the Co-op the ability to adapt to future load controlling opportunities and strategies and maintain affordable load management rates. Certified Cooperative employees holding master and journeyworker electrician licenses are changing out the equipment, which help keep costs down.

Focus right now is on changing out DRUs for members enrolled in the Dual Fuel

program. There are 6,869 load controllers that need to be changed out, of which 14% have been completed as of August 31, 2023. Additionally, all DRUs for members enrolled in the Interruptible Irrigation, Interruptible Generator and ChargeWise programs have been successfully changed out.

As of the end of August, Cooperative electricians have changed out a total of 1,829 DRUs throughout the Stearns Electric service territory.

CURRENT ENERGYWISE PARTICIPANT NOTICE: IS YOUR ENERGYWISE DUAL FUEL SYSTEM WINTER READY?

If you have a Dual Fuel heating system, now is the time to be sure your back-up heating system is prepared and that you have adequate fuel supply.

When will Dual Fuel heating systems be controlled?


- During periods of high demand (coldest winter evenings) and when market prices are high, but other factors can lead to load control as well.
- Up to 400 hours during the heating season.
- Control periods will not exceed 12 hours on a single day.
- Any time of the day, but typically in the early evening (4:30 - 9:30 p.m.) and occasionally in the morning.
- Participants should expect 20 control days totaling an estimated 108 hours this winter, with most occurring between December and February.

We encourage you to fill your secondary fuel source and ensure it is working properly in preparation for winter. Fossil fuel prices typically climb over the coming months and peak high during the middle of winter.

REMEMBER: CHECK BEFORE YOU FLIP YOUR BREAKER OFF

Are you planning to close up your seasonal home, head out on a long vacation or travel south for the winter? Be sure you don't inadvertently shut off the breaker that supplies power to your off-peak meter for either your electric water heater or off-peak electric heat source. This will cause the electric heat or water heater to be billed at the general service rate instead of the off-peak rate.

If you have an electric water heater, we encourage you to have a qualified installer equip your water heater with a disconnect switch. This enables you to shut off your water heater at your convenience while maintaining power to the off-peak meter.



DID YOU KNOW?

Stearns Electric Association refunds capital, above the cost of operations, to its members in the form of Capital Credits. Capital Credit checks, for both Stearns Electric and our wholesale power provider, Great River Energy, are mailed to members in November.

CEO MESSAGEBOARD WEIGHS OPTIONS ON COOPERATIVE'S PROPERTY TAX

Settle or Proceed to Tax Court

Under a Minnesota law that has existed since 1939 (Minn. Stat. 273.41), electric co-ops in the state pay a per member fee of \$10 for each 100 members in lieu of property tax on distribution equipment outside of incorporated areas. Although the law has not changed in over 80 years, in 2021, the Minnesota Department of Revenue (DOR) began reinterpreting this exemption and started implementing property tax on certain rural equipment. This violates the statute and increases Stearns Electric's property tax.

Since 2021, we have fought this reinterpretation through appeals with the MN DOR. Most recently, on August 17, we once again appealed our 2023 apportionable market value, which is ultimately used to calculate the Cooperative's annual property taxes. We estimate this reinterpretation has cost Stearns Electric Association an additional \$450,000 in taxes over the last three years on equipment that was previously untaxed.

Until there is new legislation that clarifies the language in the statute, Stearns Electric will see an increase of about \$150,000 per year in property taxes. It is frustrating to say that clarifying language is needed for 80+ year old legislation, but this is exactly why you have heard us state that this is one of our top priorities at Stearns Electric.

In both 2022 and 2023, legislators came to a bipartisan consensus in the agreed to Omnibus Tax Bill, reaffirming the exemption of co-op distribution equipment from property tax. Unfortunately, the Tax Bill did not pass in the 2022 legislation and the exemption provision was cut from the Omnibus Bill in the final hours of the 2023 regular session.

We appreciate the legislative support we have received on this issue. Senator Aric Putnam authored the 2023 bill and recently joined the Cooperative during its MN DOR Appeal. Other senators and legislators throughout our service territory have listened to our concerns and appear eager to act on behalf of the Cooperative in the 2024 session. One of our biggest challenges is seemingly coming from an unwritten rule – where legislation ends up being removed when there is pending litigation. In this case, we know other co-ops have taken this issue to tax court, so we believe this is why legislation failed to pass in 2023.

Stearns Electric is not the only Minnesota cooperative experiencing increased property taxes. We work together closely with the other impacted cooperatives and remain in frequent contact. I want to be clear: Stearns Electric, like all electric cooperatives, wants to pay its fair share of our local taxes, but we do not want to pay more than is authorized by state law. We do pay property taxes both on our equipment that is located within incorporated areas and on our 33 substation properties.

- A facility update was provided, including information on the construction manager request for proposals, which are due back to Stearns Electric on September 1, 2023.
- A resolution for CEO Matt
 O'Shea to procure an Energy,
 Efficiency and Electrification
 (EEE) loan from Great River
 Energy for a member-business
 was approved.

CYBERSECURITY AWARENESS

In today's world, most of us don't leave the front door unlocked. We protect our homes, loved ones and valuables from intruders with locks, alarms and other security measures. Cybersecurity is no different. It's the practice of protecting other valuables such as your identity, banking and health records and other sensitive information from digital attacks and theft.

KEEPING THE ELECTRIC GRID AND YOUR DATA SECURE

Taking necessary steps to protect member and security data used at our Cooperative is a year-round practice at Stearns Electric Association. Part of offering excellent service is keeping that service secure and reliable.

For Stearns Electric Association, reliability means repairing wearand-tear, upgrading our equipment to withstand storms and severe weather, and using technology and best practices to keep our system secure from cybersecurity issues. We work daily to protect your personal data and information from cybersecurity breaches.

We also work together with co-ops across the country to develop new technologies and infrastructure, learn from each other and keep the grid's network secure. While we can't stop a storm or predict every disruption, as a co-op, we do everything we can to keep the lights on and our members protected. Because if we all do our part, our interconnected world will be safer and more secure for everyone.

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

In honor of Cybersecurity Awareness Month coming up in October, here are four tips from the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Agency (CISA), an agency of the United States Department of Homeland Security, that is responsible for strengthening cybersecurity and infrastructure protection to keep you safe online:

- Implement multi-factor authentication (also known as twostep verification) on your accounts. The additional layer of protection makes it much harder for criminals to access your information.
- Update your software. This is one of the easiest ways to
 protect your personal data. When downloading a software
 update, make sure it's coming straight from the company
 that created it. Beware of fake pop-ups that request urgent
 downloads. Better yet, turn on automatic updates.
- Think before you click. Most successful cyber-attacks start with a phishing email. Don't take the bait. Avoid emails (or texts) that look too good to be true, oddly urgent, poorly crafted or include unusual requests.
- 4. Create strong passwords. Use long, unique and complex words or phrases. Consider using a password manager to save time, work across all devices, protect your identity and notify you of potential phishing websites.

Being cyber smart is the best way to protect yourself and others from cyber-attacks. No single tip is foolproof but when used together, they can make a real difference for taking control of your online presence. Following these tips is easy and free.

BEWARE OF PHONE SCAMS

Scams can also happen over the phone. Please know that Stearns Electric will always ask you to verify your account with specific personal information such as an account number, name, address, etc. when we call you. We will also never call and allow you only a few minutes to pay your utility bill prior to being disconnected. Please stop and think before releasing personal banking information over the phone. When in doubt, hang up and call us back at (800) 962-0655 to verify that a call or request is legitimate.

VARIABLE FREQUENCY DRIVE (VFD)

WHY DID YOU DECIDE TO INSTALL A VARIABLE FREQUENCY DRIVE (VFD) FOR YOUR IRRIGATOR?

We installed the electric variable frequency drive (VFD) on our irrigator in 2022 as our diesel motor was nearing the end of its life. We decided at that time that the investment into the electric VFD motor made more sense looking at electric rates versus diesel rates.

WHAT HAS BEEN THE BIGGEST BENEFIT?

The cost has been the biggest benefit. The cost per acre and price per hour of run time is cheaper than using the diesel motor. There are also environmental benefits, less maintenance to worry about and it's much easier to switch between high and low pressure with the VFD.

ARE THERE ANY INCONVENIENCES?

The only inconvenience thus far has been the learning curve with the VFD technology. It takes a little bit of time to manage what the best settings are for your crop.

HOW MUCH DID YOU RECEIVE IN REBATES? We received a \$2,000 rebate for a 200 hp VFD.

HOW MUCH MONEY HAVE YOU SAVED?

In comparing electric costs to the current cost of diesel this year, we will save nearly \$20,000 throughout our 2023 irrigation season.

HOW MUCH ENERGY HAVE YOU SAVED?

The VFD has saved us about 300% in our energy consumption year-over-year by being able to vary the speed of the pump to a lower speed as needed to run the irrigation system at its maximum efficiency level.





STEARNS ELECTRIC ENERGYWISE AGRICULTURAL IRRIGATION VFD

Installing a Variable Frequency Drive (VFD) allows the irrigator pump to speed up or slow down to provide uniform application of water and maintain correct pressures throughout the irrigation system. Typically, a VFD will be most beneficial for a system that has end guns or swing arms, precision application packages or one pump supplying water to multiple irrigation systems.

REBATE REQUIREMENTS:

- Evaluation must be complete before funds will be issued for the rebate.
- Members and vendors must submit itemized equipment invoices, rebate applications and manufacturer equipment specifications.
- The Cooperative reserves the right to conduct random inspections of installations
- Rebates must be applied for within 12 months of invoice date.
- Project must comply with all program-specific rules and qualifications.
- The member is responsible for checking with the Cooperative to determine funding and availability to verify program parameters.

*The maximum rebate shall not exceed 25% of material costs OR project cost, up to \$10,000 per member.

Stearns Electric offers residential, commercial, industrial and agricultural rebates for our member-consumers. MN COLD WEATHER RULE EFFECTIVE OCTOBER 1

The Minnesota Cold Weather Rule, under statute (216B.097), protects residential utility customers during the cold winter months. Under this rule, your electric service will not be disconnected for nonpayment between October 1 through April 30 if electricity is the primary heat source and you meet Cold Weather Rule (CWR) requirements.

To qualify, you must meet ALL the following conditions:

- You declare an inability to pay by completing the "Inability to Pay Form."
- Your total household, not individual, income is at or below 50% of the state median income. You must provide the necessary documentation to support this condition.
- Your account is current for the billing period immediately prior to October 1, or you mutually agree to a payment arrangement with the Stearns Electric billing department.


If you do not meet all of these listed conditions, then you do not qualify for the winter shut-off protection. However, you can still continue to receive electric service if you call us to make a mutually acceptable payment arrangement. The law does allow for Stearns Electric to disconnect when it is necessary from October 1 to April 30, so please act promptly. Before disconnecting electric service during this time, Stearns Electric must provide:

- A 30-day notice of disconnection;
- A statement of members' rights and responsibilities;
- A list of local energy assistance providers;
- Forms on which to request Cold Weather Rule protection; and
- A statement explaining available payment plans and other options to continue service.

To avoid a disconnection under the CWR, you must make and keep an acceptable payment arrangement with the Cooperative and meet all the conditions listed above. This applies to all residential customers, including senior citizens and families with young children. If you make and keep a CWR payment arrangement, you are protected until April 30.

Stearns Electric works closely with members during the CWR period, just as we do throughout the year. We don't want to interrupt service to any member, but in a cooperative, all members suffer when any bill remains unpaid. Stearns Electric would rather work with members to establish and maintain adequate payment arrangements of their past due bill, but sometimes a disconnection must take place.

STORED WATER HEATING AND STORAGE HEAT CONTROL PERIOD CHANGES THIS WINTER

Reminder: For this winter season, the electric thermal storage schedules for water heating and space heating are controlled from 6:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. from October 1, 2023 through April 30, 2024.

CEO MESSAGECONTINUED...

Throughout this process, the leadership team working on this issue has been guided by the Cooperative's Board of Directors. At their meeting on August 24, our Board discussed this issue extensively once again. The Board is currently weighing our options, which are:

Settling the 2023 apportionable market value. This means that the Cooperative would pay more than it believes it should for property taxes in 2023 and will need to continue appealing to the MN DOR in future years until clarifying legislative language is passed.

Taking the MN DOR to tax court. It is likely that multiple impacted cooperatives in Minnesota will take the MN DOR to tax court. If a favorable decision is made in tax court, these additional property taxes would not be paid and this issue would likely be put to rest. This could take a few years and would involve multiple cooperatives pooling together on attorney and legal fees.

There are pros and cons to both scenarios. Based on what we know from other cooperatives, some have chosen to settle while a majority are planning to go to tax court. As this newsletter goes to print, our Cooperative's decision has not been determined. Stearns Electric will keep you informed and continue to speak up on issues like this that impact our members.

COOKING CORNER CORN CASSEROLE

INGREDIENTS
